Morning Drop of Line:

Morning drop-off's are notoriously busy places for every school in America, especially in the cold or the rain. After all, approximately 300 students are being dropped off in a 20 minute time span. Please keep in mind the following to make drop off even more efficient, but also safer, as frustration with traffic sometimes leads to bad decisions.

- Please pull all the way up in the line, as far as you can go, so more cars can fit in line and drop off in tandem. Then go. The next wave of drop-offs can then come in. You do not have to drop off exactly at the cross walk. Please pull up.
- Please have your child <u>ready to exit the vehicle</u> from the <u>crossing guard side</u> (where the trees and grass are). This is safer. Students should have their book bag, Chromebook case and mask all ready to exit the vehicle quickly.
- <u>Please do not wait in the line</u> for your child to cross the street and enter the building. This creates a clog. As you are waiting, more cars are piling up behind, or passing. Please keep the line moving.
- Try not to pass vehicles unless it is absolutely necessary.

Chromebook Collection:

It seems we have persevered through the rising Covid cases and did not go virtual. Trends are decreasing in the community and drastically decreasing in our schools, so we are going to collect the Chromebooks back from grades 3 and 4 on Wednesday, January 19th. Please have your child bring the following three things to school on this day.

1) Chromebook

2) Charger

3) Carrying Case

Grades 5 and 6 will continue to travel back and forth with their chrome books. They have proven to be responsible and careful enough with the technology to continue. This can always change though. <u>Please have your 5th and/or 6th grade child bring the Chromebook back every day to school charged</u>.

Absences:

If your child will be absent, the responsible adult **must call the school before 8:00am** at (201) 445-3880 then **Press** #1: leave his or her name, the child's name, the child's teacher's name, and the reason for absence on the answering machine. Please do not just email the teacher as the teacher could be absent. Safety is always a priority. If we do not hear from a parent of an absent student, we do the following until a parent/guardian is reached:

- 1) Main office calls parents to verify absence
- 2) Main office calls emergency contacts
- 3) Main office will institute a robo call to all child contacts
- 4) Main office will contact the police

Birthday's in School:

Teachers will set up activities in grades 3-5 to celebrate your child's birthday. Please do not send in snacks, gifts, goodie bags, etc. for the class. Sometimes, not every time, it becomes a competition for the best gifts or goodie bags to send home, or there are not enough, and it all unravels.
